Purpose and Use of Checklists

Dear Parents and Caretakers of Students:

Often parents and caretakers place their children in public schools and learn that police officers are among the adults involved in their children's education and discipline. Over the years, SFY has interviewed and trained with many such officers—including sworn officers deployed by municipal police departments, sheriff's deputies, officers hired by the school system, and security guards.

Routinely, we find that parents are not aware of the scope of officers' authority, and officers are not aware of what parents have been told about law enforcement's role in the school. This causes anxiety, confusion, and at times produces significant problems that are hard to resolve and cast a shadow over school climate.

In an effort to address these issues with officers, SFY raises and discusses them during our Policing the Teen Brain in School trainings.

In an effort to support parents' understanding, SFY has created this "checklist" to provide parents with a set of questions that will help parents understand the scope of authority of law enforcement is used in their children's schools. The checklist focuses on issues key to children's experience of law enforcement and helps parents anticipate issues that may arise during their child's schooling.

Answers to the questions raised in the checklist are useful for creating a parent guide about how the academic and law enforcement approaches in your child's school can converge or collide.
