THINK ABOUT IT FIRST







Remember:

- If you are 12 to 17 years old, you go to Juvenile Court.
- Once you turn 18, you go to Adult Court.

The impact of a court record could include:

- Your family getting evicted or losing public housing.
- Being suspended or expelled from school.
 Getting rejected by the military.
- Not getting or delaying when you can get a driver's license.
- Getting rejected for a job at a daycare or summer camp.
- Getting rejected for a job with the federal government.
- Putting your immigration status at risk.

If you have a record:

 If you are found delinquent, you are at most "adjudicated" so don't say you've been "convicted" on job application forms.

To seal/expunge your record:

- Your record is never automatically sealed.
- You must submit a form to ask the court to seal (hide) your record.
- In some cases, you may be able to expunge (permanently erase) your record.
